About Zion Lutheran Church Women (ZLCW)

The ZLCW is an organization within Zion Lutheran Church and is made up of all confirmed women of Zion.

Anyone interested in being vice president should call Karen Childs or Barbara Ash. The officers and circle chairmen meet the second Wednesday of every month at 1 p.m. in Room 101. Those interested are welcome to join the group.

In the past all confirmed women of Zion were divided into circles that met monthly. Because many women returned to the work force, attendance dwindled in some circles to the point no one came. It was decided to put all confirmed women of Zion in one alphabetical list and each woman could attend a circle of their choice:

- 1. **Evening Bible Study** meets the third Monday of each month at 6:30 p.m. in the Zion library. They are using the Bible study in the *Gather* magazine. For more information contact Dorothy Eidahl.
- 2. **Afternoon Circle** meets the fourth Thursday of each month at 1:00 p.m. in Room 101 and also uses the Bible study in the *Gather* magazine. Contact Joy Christianson.
- 3. **Dorcas Circle** meets the fourth Wednesday at 9:30 a.m. at a hostess' home. Contact is Sandy Rhode. This group does not meet in June or July
- 4. **Faith Circle** meets at 12:00 noon on the third Thursday of each month. Chairs are Marian Teckam and Eileen Elertson.

The ZLCW has two annual fund raisers – a Rummage Sale in August and a Salad Supper the end of September. Women are asked to help at each by working the event and/or bringing food for the latter event. The money raised from these fundraisers is used to benefit Zion, Shawano community, Camp Scholarships, and globally.

Each funeral lunch held at Zion is served by a Service Group. Each group has a Chairman and one or two callers. The Chairman determines the amount of food needed and communicates with the caller(s) who call women of the church, as listed in a master list. Whenever a woman brings food and/or works at the funeral lunch, it is recorded and dated how she participated.

All women of Zion are encouraged to be part of the ZLCW – in a leadership role or a volunteer -- at the various events. Thank you to all of you who make the ZLCW a success.

Prayerfully consider how you can be a part of the ZLCW.

Wedding Receptions – contact Mila Waukechon – must be catered & small.

<u>Duties of Chairwomen</u> - Plan and prepare meals (including clean-up); order meat, cheese, buns; charge and pick up at Charlie's County Market, plus pick up mayo, mustard, 2% milk, and pickles, as needed; and be sure to fill out worksheets.

Please write a request for janitors for Fellowship Hall seating or Coffee Hour area table set- up in advance.

<u>Duties of Callers</u> – Contact church members for cakes, salads, pickles, and kitchen workers; make a list of things to be brought and by whom. Help with preparation and clean-up, if possible. You may accept monetary donations from members who are unable to bring food.

Bills charged at Charlie's County Market should be signed by chair person and labeled for which funeral they are for. Turn all bills in to the ZLCW treasurer as soon as possible. All bill totals are given to the funeral director, who will reimburse ZLCW. (Families may opt to give more.)

Food and money donations will be requested for both Zion and Jerusalem churches from an alphabetized list of all the members of Zion. The book containing name listings will be kept under the Information Desk in the Commons, making it easier to access for kitchen workers.

FUNERAL MENU

A choice of the following suggested meals will be served buffet style at the request of the family:

1. Luncheon

Family provides for:

Sandwiches (meat, egg, cheese served on bread or rolls). For 60 people, approximately 8# sliced ham and 3# sliced turkey or roast beef. Buns – 1.5 buns per person or 8 dozen (96). It's better to have extra.

Service Group will furnish:

- → Salads (variety) for 60 people request at least 6 x 10 servings.
- → Pickles 2 quarts for 60 people
- → Desserts/Bars at least six to serve 60 people
- → Beverages Milk 1.5 gallons for 60 people; coffee amount at your discretion (100 cups or more).
- 2. Finger Foods during visitation upstairs.

Family provides plated hors d'oeuvres, cookies and bars. Service Group will serve and maintain cleanliness of area and kitchen as necessary.

Service Group will furnish:

- → Beverages coffee, ice water, juice or punch.
- → Paper products cups, glasses, plates, forks, napkins, ice.

Leftovers may be packaged for the family, donated to SAFPARC and/or Safe Haven, as instructed, kept for another Zion event in the near future, or for kitchen/funeral helpers to take home.

KITCHEN CLEANING

The kitchen will have a thorough cleaning twice a year in the spring and fall. Calls will be made for volunteers to help clean.

Please try to keep it as clean and orderly as possible.

Take-Along Shopping List for LWR Kits

Cut out or photocopy this list and keep it in your purse or wallet for easy reference. It's a great way to take advantage of yard sales and back-to-school and other seasonal sales.

Fabric Kits

- <u>Two pieces</u> of cotton or cotton-blend fabric (no knits or 100% polyester); fabric should have no stains or holes and be cut in to pieces measuring:
- 2 ½ yards of 60" wide fabric **OR**
- 3 yards of 44" wide fabric OR
- 4 yards of 36" wide fabric
- Two spools of matching or neutral-colored general purpose thread, 250 300 yards each.

These are used for teaching income-generating sewing and tailoring skills for self support.

Personal Care Kits

- One light- or medium-weight bath size towel (approximately 52" x 27"), dark color recommended.
- Two bath-size bars (4 to 5 oz.) of soap, any brand, in original wrapping.
- One adult-size toothbrush in its original packaging or a businesssize envelope.
- One sturdy comb, remove packaging.
- One metal nail clippers, remove packaging.

Wrap all the items in the towel and tie securely with ribbon or yarn.

Special Note: Please do not purchase items with religious symbols or messages, U.S. flags, patriotic or military symbols, or references to the armed forces, including camouflage, for use in LWR kits.

School Kits

- Four 70-sheet notebooks of wide-or college-ruled paper approximately 8" x 10 ½"; no loose-leaf paper.
- One 30-centimeter ruler or a ruler with centimeters on one side and inches on the other.
- One pencil sharpener.
- One blunt scissors (safety scissors with embedded steel blades)
- Five unsharpened #2 pencils w/ erasers
- One 2-inch eraser
- Five ballpoint pens (no gel ink)
- One box of 16 or 24 crayons.
- One sturdy drawstring backpack-style cloth bag approximately 14" x 17" with shoulder straps (no standard backpacks); recommended fabrics include heavy cotton, canvas, denim, and twill. (Bags are provided by Zion quilters)

Baby Care Kits

- Two lightweight cotton t-shirts.
- Two long- or short-sleeved gowns or sleepers (without feet).
- Two receiving blankets, medium-weight cotton or flannel, or crocheted or knitted with lightweight yarn, up to 52" square.
- Four cloth diapers, flat fold preferred.
- One jacket, sweater or sweatshirt with a hood, or include a baby cap.
- Two pairs of socks.
- One hand towel, dark color recommended.
- Two bath-size bars (4 to 5 oz.) of gentle soap, in original wrapping.
- Two diaper pins or large safety pins.

Gently used, clean items (no stains or tears) can be substituted for new ones. Wrap items in one of the receiving blankets and secure with diaper pins. Sizes up to 24 months may be used. Varying the sizes of the clothing items included will make the kit more useful as the baby grows. Sweaters may be knitted or crocheted from yarn, or made from heavy double knits or fleece. Select a pattern that suits your skill level. Preferred styles have buttons or ties down the front. For pattern recommendations go to lwr.org/beinvolved and click on Baby Care Kits.
