#### ZION COMMUNITY BLOOD DRIVE

ZION's next **Blood Drive** will be held **Mon., April 15** from **1:30** to **5:30 PM** in the **Church Narthex**. You may give blood every 56 days! Save your donation gift for our ZION Drive. It's simple and easy!

#### What to do before:

• Eat iron rich foods for many days in advance.



- Receive a call for an appointment from our Health Ministry committee, the Blood Center, or check here at ZION when the schedule becomes available.
- Before arriving, hydrate and eat well the day of the drive.

<u>Appointment</u>: (takes less than 1 hour — especially if you answer questions ahead of time online.)

- Bring picture ID (Driver's License).
- Answer questions and check the medication list ahead of time online. Directions will follow in church announcements before our blood drive on how to do this before coming to your appointment. If you cannot do this beforehand, you can do this as you enter ZION for your appointment.
- Temperature, blood pressure and hemoglobin checked.
- Give blood. (Takes about 10-15 minutes.)
- Drink juice and eat snacks for 10-15 minutes before leaving to ensure you are feeling OK.

*Give the gift of life!* ZION members, give your pint of blood to help save up to three lives. There is a nationwide shortage right now. Be a hero, make your appointment to give blood, and help save lives! All blood drawn stays in surrounding communities! ZION's Health Ministry committee thanks you. **R**

# PERSONAL CARE KITS

During Lent, ZION Lutheran Church Women (ZLCW) would like to provide this opportunity for all members to contribute to personal care kits for Lutheran World Relief (LWR).

When families find their homes destroyed or must flee for their safety, soap, and a towel rarely what they carry. Arriving in a refugee camp or other safe place, they are scared, vulnerable, and dirty from the travel. The items included in a **Personal Care Kit** provide much-needed self-care, critical germ-fighting, and the chance to regain dignity amidst situations of fear and uncertainty.

# When choosing items for personal care kits, please follow these guidelines:

- ✓ Give new items only.
- ✓ Do not donate items that have any religious symbols, messages, or ZION's name on any item.
- ✓ Do not donate any items decorated with a U.S. flag, patriotic or military symbols, or references to the armed forces, including camouflage.

#### The following are needed for each Personal Care Kit:

- ✓ One light-weight bath-size towel (20"x40" to 27"x52") Dark-colored recommended.
- ✓ Two or three bath-size bars of soap (8-9 oz.) of any brand, in original wrap, <u>no</u> mini or hotel-size bars.
- ✓ One adult-size toothbrush in its original packaging
- ✓ One sturdy comb (no picks or fine-toothed combs)
- ✓ One metal nail clipper.

In our Gospel Lesson for Easter morning, Mary was confronted by a roller-coaster of emotions, perhaps like what many of us face today.

In a very authentic way, Mary herself was feeling anxious and isolated. After all, she was coming to a tomb by herself in the darkness. The pain Mary experienced was beyond description. What she had experienced on Friday was blazing through her. She had watched as Jesus Christ, her Lord and Savior — her best friend, was beaten, nailed to a Cross, left to bleed and suffocate alone and eventually die. His body had been taken down. Joseph of Arimathea and Nicodemus had gone to Pilate and asked for it. They wrapped it in spices with strips of linen and laid it in a tomb-where it would stay-all by itself. Then, a large stone was rolled over the entrance — sealing it.

What a feeling of loneliness and despair must have come upon all those who had followed Jesus, threatening to swallow them up. They must have felt so helpless ... so confused ... in shock. After all, they had dropped everything to follow Jesus — their jobs, their dreams and all their plans.

They had been with Him for three incredible years. They had heard Him talk about God and watched Him love in ways no one had loved before. He fed 5,000 people with a few fish and loaves of bread. He had healed the sick, raised the dead, and made the insane sane. He had become their hope amid the despair of this life, the missing piece of the puzzle, and now He was dead and gone — forever. How could they go on? Was life even worth living anymore? Can you imagine the darkness, the pain, the feelings of hopelessness and despair? Perhaps some of you can. Maybe some of you feel that way as we look ahead to Easter.

Mary Magdalene stood outside Jesus' tomb crying on that first Easter morning. She had come to mourn and show her respects to the One who had meant everything in the world to her, but when she got there, the stone had been rolled away, and the tomb was empty. Now, she was empty and alone, but so was Jesus' tomb. How could this be happening?

Jesus has experienced the ultimate isolation Himself — when hanging on the Cross, He cried out: "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" He did that for us, whatever we are going through; He has compassion and empathy. So, again, how are we to celebrate Easter in these isolated and anxious times?

We focus on the fact that Jesus comes to us in our loneliness. Jesus comes to us in our tears, in our fear



and anxiety. He stands among us, as He is doing right now, and lovingly and compassionately whispers: "Peace be with you!" Even though it may not seem like it, things will be alright. And that is because Jesus Christ has risen from the dead! Jesus swallowed up death in victory! The tomb is empty! God is with us always and forever, and that is all that matters when it comes down to it.

The world we once knew may seem a distant memory this Easter, but we are not alone. Our hope is Jesus' triumph over the darkness and the loneliness of death. It brings us new life if we will believe. It overcomes our isolation and fear, for we are not alone!

I invite you to actively participate as we go through Lent, Holy Week, and Easter. If you cannot worship in person, I invite you to worship via YouTube. May God bless you and your family in these troubling days, and may you feel the peace our Savior offers us! **R**

#### NEW LIBRARY BOOK

#### THE WINGS OF POPPY PENDLETON\* by Melanie Dobson

On the eve of Poppy's fifth birthday in 1907, her parents tucked her safely in bed, where she listened to her parents entertain New York's elite in their Thousand Islands castle. The following day, she is gone, and her father is found dead in his smoking room. Desperate to see her daughter - or at least find out what happened to her - Amelia Pendleton struggles to move on with her devastated life. Fast forward to 1922. Though Chloe Ridell lives in the shadows of Poppy's castle, which is now in ruins, she has little interest in the mystery that still captivates tourists and locals alike. She focused on preserving the island she inherited from her grandparents and reviving their vintage candy shop. Until the day a girl named Emma shows up on Chloe's doorstep with few possessions and saves a tattered scrapbook that connects her to the Pendleton family. When a reporter arrives at Chloe's store, asking questions about her grandfather, Chloe decides to help him dig into a past she thought best left buried. The haunting truth about Poppy, they discover, could save Emma's life, so Chloe and Logan must work together to investigate what happened long ago on Koster Isle precisely. R

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### ZION PRAYER CHAIN

**Prayer is powerful!** The telephone Prayer Chain here at ZION has existed for 25+ years. I inherited it when Rita Lemke wanted to step down as a captain 15 years ago. We then added it to the Health Ministry



committee to help members meet their spiritual needs. It has been restructured over the years, going from two daytime chains and one evening chain to only two daytime chains. In February, the new prayer chains were created from last year's lists, new preferences, and the most recent Time & Talent sign-up sheets.

The prayer chain works like this: **Eileen Elertson** (715.526.3500) and **Winnie Preston** (715.851.9576) are our two co-captains, each with their team. You may call them to request prayers for you, your family, friends, and relatives who may or may not necessarily belong to ZION. They write down the request received: name of the caller, name to pray for, and request in the exact words given. Each co-captain calls the first person on her list. The spelling of the names and precise words are written down by the receiver and repeated for accuracy. Then, that person prays and calls the next one on the list. Nothing can be changed or added to the message. If the next person is not home, a voicemail is left. Then, the caller must call the next person on the list, etc. The last person calls the co-captain to say the prayer chain is complete.

Some side rules: If you find a prayer request on your answering machine, you pray because the person before you made the following call already. If the request has been made by and is for someone on your list, you skip that person and call the next one listed. It is important to keep calling those on your list until you talk to someone, keeping the chain unbroken. Once the calls are complete, you will keep the person prayed for in your daily prayers for the next two weeks. Everyone on the two prayer chains has already been mailed the new lists for this year, with a copy of the procedure and rules to follow attached. If you are interested in being on a prayer chain, fill out the Time & Talent sheet next fall or call a co-captain to add you to the list. In this age of cell phones, even our snowbirds can be on a team. Keep your prayer requests coming! Prayer is powerful when many are doing it! R
