Zion Lutheran Church Reopening Plan

"Not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as is the manner of some, but exhorting one another, and so much the more as you see the day approaching." – Hebrews 10:25

The Church Council and Re-entry Task Force have been meeting, discussing and has prepared a plan that will allow us to start back into corporate worship. Please understand that the Covid-19 pandemic is still ongoing, the risk of infection is still present and that our recommendations for opening are to allow for this to happen in the safest manner that we can. In the process of this plan the Re-Entry Task Force have reviewed many different churches, listened to the advice of our Bishop, consulted with local medical experts, heard from our Worship and Music Committee, and discussed our intensions with the Shawano County Park Director and lastly – Zion's insurance carrier. This team has done their due-diligence and listened to your concerns and desires.

At Zion, we want you to know we are going above and beyond to keep our people safe and healthy. It would not surprise anyone that many of you have friends, relatives or coworkers who know of churches that are already worshipping in person together. That makes everything very confusing and difficult because every congregation has different needs and demographics.

Please also understand that in the early days of us coming together in worship that things will look and feel different than before the pandemic. Moving forward, we will be offering the following ways to worship:

- Virtual Worship We will continue to put our worship service each week on You Tube as we have since we halted corporate worship in March. Weekend worship services are available on DVD and/or a printed copy of the sermon by request.
- Mid-Week Worship Until further notice we will provide a mid-week worship experience outside the church at 11:00 AM and 6:00 PM on Wednesdays. If bad weather should happen we will make an alternative plan depending on how many people attend these services.
- Service In The Park We will begin services in the Shawano County Park on Sunday, July 12. In discussion with the Park's management they are expecting record numbers in the park on the Fourth of July weekend. So many that it would be impossible to manage

safe distancing. To start earlier than the 4th and then stopping for one weekend with all the logistics involved made this date the earliest we felt was possible.

Worship In The Sanctuary – We will begin worship in the sanctuary on Saturday, July 11 at 5:00pm and Sunday, July 12 at 8:00am. This service will be recorded to be viewed on You Tube. The reason for the delayed start in the sanctuary is numbers. Church attendance in the summer months are normally less than during the school year. With Zion's three services (with the most attending the County Park service) we felt that waiting until the weekend after the 4th would spread people out and we wouldn't have to take reservations to worship or only except 25% of the sanctuary's capacity as the other larger churches are doing in the area.

WHAT TO EXPECT

In order to start worshipping together in person these safeguards will be implemented at all Zion services:

- 1. If you have had any of the following symptoms this week, please worship with us on You Tube:
 - Fever over 100



- Cough or sore throat
- Shortness of breath
- Contact with anyone confirmed to have COVID-19 in the past 14 days.
- 2. We ask that you to please maintain a six-foot distance from all non-household members at all times. Smile with your eyes, wave and say hello, but please don't hug or touch others during this season.
- 3. Pews have been taped-off in the sanctuary to provide safe distancing and will be sanitized between services.
- 4. Bathroom occupancy will be limited to half the number of stalls or urinals.
- 5. We encourage masks to be worn at all times by all worshippers. All volunteers and staff will wear masks. Masks are strongly encouraged but not required except for during congregational singing. If you would like to sing, you will be required to wear a mask during that portion of the service.

Wind, and Fire, and Tongues...

It's been several weekends now since we celebrated Pentecost, with its wind and fire and tongues. Between the social unrest that started in

my birthplace of Minneapolis and the pandemic that has upended any signs of normalcy in our lives. These weeks have felt incredibly long, but the flame of the Holy Spirit is still igniting in our hearts, still spurring us to let God's Spirit speak through us. Across the world, in all languages, voices are being raised to cry out for justice.

In this season, the confusion of mixed messages from the medical world, politicians, neighbors, family members, and now protestors feels so great that it is almost overwhelming. But don't let that kind of grief stop you from living into the relationship for which you were created. Don't turn your eyes away from seeing the need to care for one another. Don't turn your ears away from hearing the cries of sadness, fear, and even anger coming from one another. Don't turn your back on your human siblings who need you to show up for them, in whatever way you can.

If you're feeling doubtful – doubtful that you can make a difference, doubtful that you know the right words or actions to take, doubtful that anything will ever really change – if you're feeling doubtful, then the Gospel writer Matthew has a word for you today.

From the end Matthew's Gospel, when the risen Jesus appears to the disciples we learn that where *we might be* at this time has been experienced before. You see, they recently watched Jesus, their teacher, friend, and savior, be crucified. They've witnessed and experienced violence. They're beleaguered, terrified, grieving, and exhausted. And the text tells us that when they saw the risen Christ, they fell down in worship, "but some doubted."

It's not hard to imagine why they might have been feeling doubtful – doubtful of the reality of the resurrection, doubtful of their own commitment to Jesus, doubtful of their ability to carry on the ministry in his absence.

But no matter why they're feeling doubtful, Jesus still



calls them into mission. "Go out into the world," he says, "and invite others into the relationship that is God. Teach people about the life-giving way you have learned from me. Walk with people as fellow disciples. And when you mark their transformation with the practice of baptism, seal them in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit; seal them in relationship." This is what Jesus tells the disciples.

Despite their fear, despite their grief, despite their exhaustion, despite their doubt, they're called into mission. They're sent out to bear the good news that has changed their lives. And despite their doubt, or maybe even because of their doubt, Jesus still gives them a promise: "I am with you always." Jesus keeps that promise, always – to those disciples, and to you.

You are the inheritors of this mission and this promise. Take seriously your calling to be the bearer of the good news of Christ into the world, even when you're worn down and scared and filled with doubt. And take seriously the real presence of the Triune God that is with you, always. God is present in the world, even during confusing times like this. God is here.

It is especially hard to remember this when you're separated from your sacred space and normal liturgical practices, when you can't worship together in person or receive the sacraments, those signs of God's gracious presence.

Some of you who have driven by and dropped an offering into the "Drop Box" have told me that this was the closest they'd been to the church in months. I know others are grieving that they aren't able to safely come, even that close to the sanctuary and fellow members they love so much.

But the Lutheran tradition emphasizes that church is not a place but an event; it is something that happens. Martin Luther understood church more as a verb than a noun. Church happens because God is active in the world, in you. And often, when and where and how God acts is a surprise! Church shows up in ways you least expect. You can see signs of it, but you can't summon it or own it or control it. You can't pin church down for a photo opp. The church isn't a building, even when that building is full of people and certainly not when that building is empty.

There will be a time when you can gather again in our beautiful sanctuary to worship together. And in the meantime, God is still acting so church is still happening. Where do you see signs of it? Where do you see evidence of the grace of Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit? In your homes? On the streets? Keep watching for it and participating in it.

The God who is relationship is up to something in the world, and in you, always. The God who is relationship connects, heals, uplifts, transforms because that's what healthy, loving relationship does. *Continued....*

2020 COVID-19 AND SUMMER FUN

This summer may look a little different than past summers: summer activities during COVID-19 aren't quite the same as your traditional summer activities. As we continue social distancing and begin slowly reopening in the wake of the coronavirus epidemic, some summer traditions camps, outdoor concerts, big fireworks displays, summer vacations, may be curtailed for everyone's safety.

But that doesn't mean summer 2020 has to be dreaded. Instead of focusing on all the summer activities that have been canceled or put on the unsafe list, let's focus on all the wonderful things you can still do at home or while social distancing this summer.

Listed here are a few things families can do together during COVID-19. Make your own water park by putting up any size pool, slip and slid, and a sprinkler. Have beach balls in the pool. Super soakers and water bombs are a fun way to cool off too. Go to the beach. - 6. We encourage those who are elderly and those with health concerns to continue to worship online.
