To the Zion Faith Community:

For many of us, living through the Covid-19 virus has meant letting go of life rhythms we've known and counted on—people, places, and habits that once grounded us. This letting go, for some, has led to significant isolation; while for others it's led to the rediscovery of walkable neighborhoods and creative ways of staying connected. Debra and I have particularly enjoyed wonderful summer

days on Shawano Lake, drawing closer to a few young families in our neighborhood, and some special times with our family. The safety calculation of course is in avoiding the virus and it has become the dominant lens for all of us.

In so many ways we have been incredibly blessed at Zion. It has been a godsend to have been able to live stream worship through this period; yet it is no substitute for being with the physically gathered community. And while there are many things

we miss, we have grown accustomed to our forced flexibility. And perhaps are less apt to take things for granted in the future.

Where do we expect to find God these days? How do we expect God to show up for us?

The Scriptures record many stories of how, through the ages, people and prophets have had to come to terms with new ways of understanding who God is and how God might show up among us. I draw our attention to the prophet Elijah, whose battle against Israel's worst king on record—King Ahab—and his evil wife Jezebel had taken its toll. Even after defeating the 450 priests of Baal in one of the most celebrated contests recorded in the Hebrew Scriptures, (check it out—1 Kings 18:20-40) Elijah was feeling more *vulnerable* than *confident*. So when, in the aftermath of that encounter, Queen Jezebel puts a bounty on his head, Elijah flees for his life, journeying 40 days and 40 nights to the holy mountain of God – Horeb. Elijah arrives there feeling depressed, defeated, fearful and alone. He wonders whether all his efforts for God's sake



have been for naught. Exhausted, he crawls into this cave and he waits for a sign.

There's a lot packed into this story, into what precedes it and what comes after it, but three verses captured my attention. Elijah is commanded: "Go out and stand on the mountain before the LORD, for the LORD is about to pass by." And so Elijah, bone weary, looks toward the mouth of the cave. This is what happens next:

> There was a great wind, so strong that it was splitting mountains and breaking rocks *in pieces*...*but the LORD was* not in the wind; and after the wind an earthquake, but the LORD was not in the earthquake; and after the earthquake a fire, but the LORD was not in the fire; and after the fire a sound of sheer silence. When Elijah heard it, he wrapped his face in his mantle and went out and stood at the entrance of the cave. -1Kings 19:11b-13

It's when Elijah hears that SILENCE—so deep, so pervasive that it tugs at his ears—that he wraps his mantle around his head, crawls to the mouth of the cave, and he stands up before the LORD. Elijah has been around God long enough to learn that God may just show up in ways we least expect—not through outsized events or huge natural phenomenon or feats of strength, but in the form of sheer silence (RSV: "still small voice").

The answer to the question: "WHERE WILL GOD SHOW UP FOR US DURING THE PANDEMIC?" may surprise us. The story of Elijah invites us to not come to conclusions too quickly about where we can find God, but to remain open to how and where we see God manifested during this vulnerable time. To listen for that "still small voice" which can only be heard when we learn to filter out all the other loud, boisterous, public, competing voices which vie for our attention.

Through July General Fund expenses exceeded revenues by \$6,125 which is typical for a summer month. As these figures show our General Fund picture through July, revenues were under budget about \$23,500. General Fund balance at the end of July remained unchanged from an adjusted June, at about -\$10,596.

From Your Parish Nurse...

September 28 Blood Drive

September 28 the Community Blood Center of Appleton will be at Zion. This is the second blood drive that was hosted here at Zion. The Community Blood Center relies on area businesses of all sectors and sizes to host over 100 mobile blood drives each month.

Blood carries gases, nutrients and waste products through the body. Blood also fights infections, heals wounds and performs many other vital functions.

There is no substitute for human blood. It cannot be made or manufactured. Volunteer blood donors are the only source of blood for patients who need blood transfusions. Blood contains a number of different components, and doctors use component transfusions to give patients exactly what they need.

Blood contains three different components. Red blood cells which carries oxygen to the body's organs and tissues. The shelf life is 42 days and is given to trauma victims, and surgery patients. Platelets controls bleeding by forming clots. It has a shelf life of 5 days and is given to cancer patients and trauma victims. Plasma contains proteins that help stop bleeding and has a shelf life of 1 year. It is used for burn or trauma victims.

Blood types are determined by genetics. Donors can give whole blood every 56 days. Every 2 seconds a patient in the U.S. needs blood. One pint of blood can

save up to three lives. All blood donors of all types are need.

Donors must be 17 years old (16 with parental consent). Weigh at least 110 pounds and be in good health. Donors will need to bring a photo ID, a list of medications and international travel history.

Donors will undergo a brief health screening before donation. Your temperature, pulse, blood pressure and

hemoglobin level will be checked. In preparation before donating it is suggested to drink plenty of water and eat healthy meals days before donation. Before donation eat a healthy lunch and drink 8-10 glasses of water, avoid caffeine and wear a short-sleeve shirt and comfortable clothing. At the end of your donation you will be offered a beverage and snack. After 15 minutes you are able to leave.

Please consider donating if able on September 28 from 1:30pm until 6:00pm. The Community Blood Center will have their Blood Mobile located in the church parking lot. A sign-up sheet will

be at the Information Desk. You can also, register online by visiting www.save3lives.org. Or calling 800 -280-4102. This blood drive is hosted by the Health Ministry Committee.
