## **Treasurer's Report** by Gordon Holten, Council Treasurer

As these figures show our General Fund picture through February, revenues were under budget by nearly \$14,000 and expenses over budget by \$11,791. Also notice that Total Net amounts are negative. Throughout 2019 monthly balances were mostly negative, many lower than -\$10,000. General Fund balance at end of February 2020 is -\$22,795.

Obviously this negative trend cannot continue without serious financial problems.

# "... she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know it was Jesus." -- John 20:14

Imagine this. You have mourned the loss of a dear friend and teacher. You have watched him be murdered. Then he has been buried, and you haven't really had time to prepare or to celebrate his life. Now you have come to the cemetery, only to discover that the grave has been disturbed and the body of your dear friend is missing. All the gospels have a version of the empty tomb story. In some, the story is detailed and continues into the next days and visions of Jesus. In one, we only know the disci-

ples to be afraid. In each, the women come to the graveside because it is their task to prepare their friend for the services of remembrance that are to come. Imagine it. They come to the tomb and find it empty. What emotions would you feel: fear, disbelief, uncertainty, loss, anger?

The resurrection is a confusing story and apparently was equally confusing for those who were present at the time. Mary Magdalene, whose very life had been transformed by Jesus, came to the tomb early in the morning. Despite what Jesus may have said about the future resurrection, it is clear that Mary had come to see the dead. She believed that death was final. When she saw the empty tomb, she assumed that someone had stolen the body.

What other explanation could there be? She reported this bad news to two of Jesus' closest disciples, and they ran to the tomb. They also saw the empty tomb, but the story continues to be confusing. "Then the other disciple ... also went in and he saw and believed; for as yet they did not understand the scripture, that he must rise from the dead."

So what was it that the disciple believed? Their belief, apparently, was weakened by misunderstanding. What was their response to this earth-shattering event? "Then the disciples returned to their homes."

It was Mary who stayed around. Seeing is not believing; because we often interpret what we see by what we already believe. Because Mary believed that death was final, she did not recognize Jesus when she saw him. Even being addressed by two angels did not change for her the cold reality of death. It was only when Jesus addressed her personally that the prison of her mind was opened to believe that Christ had been raised from the dead. When she believed, she was able to see. Despite her confusion, she did not leave, and, in her staying, she became the first evangelist. Sometimes, in our confusion, we have to continue to stick around until we can be addressed in a way that alters our beliefs so that we can see with new eyes.

God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and power, and today we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus who we proclaim as our Lord. What does this mean for you? What does this mean for us who identify ourselves as Christians? Simply phrased, "God wins." Sin doesn't win. Hate doesn't win. Political power doesn't win. Fear doesn't win. *Coronavirus–19 certainly will not win!* God wins. In spite of the sacrifice Jesus made, or maybe because of the sacrifice, God honored and honors him above all others.



We are called as Jesus' followers to make the same proclamation the apostles and disciples made in the first century. We are called to preach to the people and to testify to the power of God through Jesus: sins are forgiven, life is restored, and love overcomes hate and even death. How we choose to preach and testify is up to us. We can preach from a pulpit or through our actions in the world. We can say we are redeemed or we can act like we are. We can testify in church or we can make our whole lives a testament to the power of resurrection and hope. This year, celebrate, truly celebrate, the resurrection!

### From Your Parish Nurse...

#### April is Parkinson's Awareness Month

Every April, the Parkinson's Foundation engages the global Parkinson's community to support Parkinson's Awareness Month. The Foundation raises awareness about Parkinson's and how the Foundation helps make lives better for people with the disease, by improving care and advanced research toward a cure.

The theme is start a conversation, a call to action that urges people to talk about Parkinson's with their loved ones, friends, neighbors, care team and community. Awareness is the key toward a world without Parkinson's disease. Every day people in our community face obstacles.

Symptoms generally develop slowly over years. The progression of symptoms is often a bit different from one person to another due to the diversity of the disease. Not everyone will experience all the symptoms. Parkinson's is a progressive neurological condition. This means that it causes problems in the brain and gets worse over time. People with Parkinson's disease don't have enough of the chemical dopamine because some of the nerve cells that make it have died.

It can be hard to tell if a person has Parkinson's disease. A tremor which is a slight shaking in your finger, thumb or hand while at rest is a common early sign of Parkinson's disease. Handwriting appears to getting smaller than it was in the past and words are crowded together. Loss of smell and trouble smelling foods like bananas, dill pickles, or licorice could be an

early sign. Trouble sleeping by thrashing around in bed with sudden movements and acting out dreams when you are deeply asleep. Your arms don't swing like they used to when you walk. Sometimes stiffness goes away when you move. If it does not, it can be a sign of the disease. An early sign might be stiffness or pain in your shoulder or hips. People sometimes say their feet seem "stuck to the floor." A soft or low voice or your voice sounds hoarse. Sometimes you

might think other people are losing their hearing, when really you are speaking more softly. Have you been told that you have a serious, depressed or mad look on your face, even when you are not in a bad mood? This is often called facial masking. Dizziness or fainting when you stand up out of chair. This can be a sign of low blood pressure and can be linked to Parkinson's disease. Everyone has a time when they stood up and felt dizzy, but if it happens on a regular basis you should see your doctor. Another notable sign is stooping, leaning or slouching when standing. You are not standing up as straight as you use to.

No single one of these signs means that you should worry, but if you have more than one sign you should consider making an appointment to talk with your doctor to create a plan to stay healthy. For more information go to www.parkinson.org/understandingparkinsons.
