

"Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid." – John 14:27

In the church I grew up in, on the back wall of the chancel behind the altar was a simple sign that read, "Peace I give you. –John 14:27." I remember fondly growing up in that congregation, they were great years for me. Yet even then, I don't remember my life hardly being filled with a whole lot of peace. It seems like just about everything gave me cause to worry about something.

Not much has changed for me as an adult and right now I would be willing to bet for you too. We know the COVID-19 pandemic has impacted everyone — raising the level of fear, stress, and anxiety for people all over the world. Experts are calling this "Pandemic Fatigue...," that feeling of being mentally and emotionally exhausted by everything that's going on right now. We're all facing different kinds of life challenges during this time: Isolation and loneliness; anxiety over health; grief; juggling work, childcare, and schooling responsibilities; financial strain or job loss; uncertainty about the future; and the list goes on. It's no wonder we may be hit by Pandemic Fatigue, I know I have and I now hunger for peace!

Peace is not something we often hear about in our world (especially during a presidential election year). Political barbs are thrown around. Protests and riots in the streets of our bigger cities. Doesn't sound like peace does it? It sounds more like the antonym of peace which is conflict. Yet, God is the God of peace. This probably says a lot about how far our world has strayed from God.

The Bible says that Jesus is Himself, the very definition of peace (Isaiah 9:6; Luke 2:14). And not just any peace, but Jesus is literally the peace between God

and His creation (i.e., us)! You see, when Adam and Eve fell into sin, because of their disobedience, conflict arose. But this conflict wasn't only between God and a disobedient creation. This conflict was also between creation itself.

But Jesus is what He has come to do; He is peace. Is it any wonder then that He suffered so much? You see, Jesus is God the Father's answer to a rebellious creation. That's why there is a bit of irony in who Jesus is and how He was received. The God/man of peace, Jesus Christ, became a source of conflict especially between His own people.

The Bible outlines how Jesus endured much violence and hatred not of His own accord, but on that of the religious leaders of the day. Of course, such rejection was not a surprise to our Lord. It was the consequence of sin. And the same can be said about our society today. The conflict (or lack of peace) in our world has more to do with sin than anything else. Yet, what our world doesn't realize, just like the religious leaders of Jesus' day, is that God has provided the cure for sin in His Son. Only Jesus can bring real lasting peace to a world in conflict. And, as long as the world continues to reject God's peace, mark my words, there will be conflict.

As Christians, this makes our task that much more imperative and challenging. With so much conflict around us, we possess the cure. Yet, time and time again, the world rejects this cure. Alas, we are not called to be successful in the mission, only faithful (Revelation 2:10). Christ has come to save us, and He

remains near to us. Therefore, we can be at peace even during the worst conflicts this world can bring. For God's peace is not a peace that comes from a lack of conflict; it is a confidence that Jesus will rescue us no matter how difficult the situation.

From Your Parish Nurse...

October Flu Season & Covid-19

As the COVID-19 outbreak continues to evolve, comparisons have been drawn to influenza. Both cause respiratory disease, yet there are important differences between the two viruses and how they spread. Both viruses are transmitted by contact, droplets and fomites. The same public health measures need to be taken.

Hand washing and good respiratory etiquette (coughing into your elbow or into a tissue and disposing of the tissue immediately are important actions to take to prevent infection. Also, continue to wear your face covering when you are around others, and social distance 6 feet apart.

The speed of transmission is an important point of difference between the two viruses. Influenza has a shorter median incubation period (the time from infection to appearance of symptoms) and a shorter serial interval (the time between successive cases) than COVID-19 virus. The serial interval for COVID-19 virus is estimated to be 5-6 days, while for influenza virus, the serial interval is 3 days. This means that influenza can spread faster than COVID-19.

While the range of symptoms for the two viruses is similar, the fraction with severe disease appears to be different. For COVID-19, data suggest that 80% of infections are mild or asymptomatic, 15% are severe infection, requiring oxygen and 5% are critical infections requiring ventilation. These fractions of severe and critical infection would be higher than what is observed for influenza infection.

The most at risk for severe influenza infection are children, pregnant women, elderly, those with underlying chronic medical conditions and those who are immunosuppressed. For COVID-19, the current understanding is that older age and underlying conditions increase the risk for severe infection.

Influenza (flu) and COVID-19 are both contagious respiratory illnesses, but they are caused by different

viruses. COVID-19 is caused by infection with a new coronavirus (called SARS-CoV-2) and flu is caused by infection with influenza viruses. Because some of the symptoms of flu and COVID-19 are similar, it may be hard to tell the difference between them based on symptoms alone, and testing may be needed to help confirm a diagnosis. Similarities of both can have varying degrees of signs and symptoms, ranging from no symptoms to severe symptoms which can include a fever of feeling feverish/chills, cough, difficulty breathing, fatigue, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, muscle pain or body aches, headache, vomiting and diarrhea and a difference is COVID-19 may include a

Dear Pastors, Deacons and Lay Leaders,

Grace, mercy and peace to you in the name of Jesus Christ.

I write following the Synod Assembly this past Saturday where the Rev. Anne Edison-Albright was elected bishop of the East Central Synod of Wisconsin. Bishop-elect Edison-Albright currently serves as campus pastor at Luther College in Decorah, Iowa, though previously she served a congregation in this synod, Redeemer Lutheran, Stevens Point.

On Sunday I spoke with Bishop-elect Edison-Albright, congratulated her on her election and pledged that I and my staff will do everything we can to support her in this transition and ensure a strong start-up for her ministry among you beginning December 1.

As I noted in remarks to the assembly, this office is going through a number of staff transitions. Ben Stepanek, Communications Manager, resigned his position to join his spouse in her new call in Colorado. We were awaiting the bishop election and a churchwide reorganization before determining the future of the position of Director of Evangelical Mission. Finally, the call of Pastor Amy Engebose as Bishop Associate is co-terminus with my call. All of these positions and future staffing will be addressed by the Bishop-elect in due time. Thus we ask your patience and understanding as we begin the transition to a new chapter in the life of the synod.

For me personally I am in need of some time to rest and reflect, to ponder and pray about all these matters. I am grateful for good health, energy, and drive. I will wait to see to what God might be calling me and what God might have in mind for the next chapter of my life.

I have greatly enjoyed serving as bishop of this synod, working with all of you and the elected leadership and staff. Anita and I will cherish the memories and the friendships. There is still much work to be done in the weeks ahead for all of us. So I invite your prayers for Anita, me and my staff and for the Bishop-elect and her family as we all transition to a new day.
