

"Could we study Exodus instead of the book of Acts?"



"An enemy will overrun the land" Amos 3:11a

Everywhere you look things are falling apart. Maybe your marriage is falling apart, your career, your finances, your kids, your emotions or your health. Sometimes life has a way of tearing us apart. If it seems that everything in your life is falling apart today you need to know that God is still in control.



He has not fallen off of His throne. He still loves you and has a plan for your life. We tend to think that when things are falling apart God must have it in for us. It's the same theology Job had to deal with. Job's friends repeatedly told him that he must have done something really bad for his life to be falling apart the way it is. Yet what neither Job nor his friends recognized was that something was going on behind the scenes in heaven and that God was still in control, and that God was going to restore Job. God is a restorer! When things are falling apart God can put our lives back together.

We are given an incredible metaphor of how God restores us when life is falling apart in Amos 3:11-12: "Therefore this is what the Sovereign LORD says: 'An enemy will overrun the land; he will pull down your strongholds and plunder your fortresses.' 12 This is what the LORD says: 'As a shepherd saves (recovers) from the lion's mouth only two leg bones or a piece of an ear, so will the Israelites be saved, those who sit in Samaria on the edge of their beds and in Damascus on their couches."



In ancient times predators like lions and wolves would often attack the sheep and all that was usually left were pieces. These pieces would be gathered by the shepherd and taken to the sheep owner to account for the loss. Here God depicts Himself as the shepherd who recovers the two leg bones and piece of an ear. Israel would be devastated, but not

beyond recovery. God would start with two leg bones and a piece of an ear and restore Israel to blessing and favor again. God's promise of restoration to Israel is found in Amos 9:11,

Maybe there are some lions in your life that have attacked you and torn everything apart. Maybe your heart has been shattered into a thousand pieces by the assaults upon your family, your marriage, your finances or your emotions. Maybe all you are left with today

is just two leg bones and a piece of an ear. If that describes your situation today take heart because God is a restorer! He can take what is left of the pieces of your life and restore you to a place of blessing.

In my own life I can testify that when you're down to nothing, God is up to something. I know what it's like to lose a job. I know what it's like to have creditors hounding you at all hours of the day. I know what it's like not to know where your next meal is coming from. I know what it's like to have a relationship shattered. Yet I also know what it's like to watch God restore all those things and add His blessing. I'm sure there are many of you who can testify that God is a God of restoration!

In my hands a golf club is a sure shank, but in Tiger Woods' hands a golf club is fifteen major championships. In my hands a paintbrush is a doodle brush but in the hands of Michelangelo it is the Sistine Chapel. In my hands a basketball is a brick but in the hands of Michael Jordan it is six NBA championships. In my hands a scalpel is just a way to cut my fingers off, but in the hands of transplant surgeon Dr. John Najarian a patient is given a new kidney. In my hands two leg bones and a piece of an ear are worthless, but in God's hands they are the building blocks of a new life.

No matter where you are and where you've been; no matter what failures and mistakes you have made God can take what is left of the pieces of your life and redeem it for something great. You may be low today but God is getting ready to do something in your life that will amaze you. God isn't finished with you yet. Two leg bones and a piece of an ear is all you need for God to show His power in your life. There is hope for you. We must remember the lessons

from two leg bones and a piece of an ear that God restores, remains and redeems. There is a blessing right around the corner!

Dear Zion Congregation,



"Pay careful attention..."

I read a story of a woman who had finished her shopping and returned to her car to find four men inside it. She dropped her shopping bags, drew a handgun from her purse, and with a forceful voice said, "I have a gun, and I know how to use it! Get out of the car!" Those men did not wait for a second invitation. They got out and ran like crazy!

The woman, understandably shaken, quickly loaded her shopping bags and got into the car. She just wanted to get out of there as fast as she could. But no matter how she tried, she could not get her key into the ignition.

Then it hit her: This isn't my car! She looked, and indeed her car was parked four or five spaces away. She got out, looked around to see if the men were near, loaded the bags into her own car, and drove to the police station to turn herself in.



The desk sergeant, after hearing her story, nearly fell out of his chair laughing. He pointed to the other end of the counter, where four men were reporting a carjacking by a woman with glasses and curly white hair, less than five feet tall, and carrying a

large handgun. No charges were filed. She thought it was her car, but it really belonged to someone else.

God has entrusted to our management time, possessions, abilities, and even our very being. All are to

be used for His honor. We will be accountable for all these things and how we have used them. God has high expectations that we will serve Him and grow to think and care and love like He does.

Auschwitz Lullaby by Mario Escobar. On an otherwise ordinary morning in 1943, Helene Hannemann is preparing her five children for the day when the German police arrive at her home. Helene's worst fears come true when the police, under strict orders from the SS, demand that her children and husband, all of Romani heritage, be taken into custody. After a terrifying trek across the continent, they arrive at Auschwitz. Her husband is separated from them. It is discovered that Helene is not only a German but also a trained nurse, she is forced into service at the camp hospital—overseen by Dr. Mengele himself. He asks her to organize a school for the Romani children in the camp. Through sheer force of will, Helene provides a haven or the children of Auschwitz – an act of kindness and selflessness so great that it illuminates the darkest night of human history.

The Ornament Keeper by Eva Marie Everson. Separated from her husband Jackson after 20 years of marriage, Felicia Morgan is not interested in decorating for Christmas. But her children convince her to at least let them put up a tree. She begins to unwrap the ornaments Jackson gave her each Christmas to represent another year of their marriage and family. With each ornament, she starts to see not only the story of their marriage but also the story of Christmas. This is a heartwarming story of how forgiveness and healing can often come by a long and winding path.

Cricket at the Manger by Edith Hope Fine. A little cricket is in the stable trying to sleep, but is kept awake by all the noise – lots of people, a weary man and his wife with a donkey, a shepherd girl, and an angel. The cricket is lifted up to see what is in the manger.

This Is the Star by Joyce Dunbar. With full page illustrations, the book tells the story of Jesus' birth. This is the Christ child, born to be king. While hosts of heavenly angels sing.

This Is the Stable by Cynthia Cotton. The story shows pictures and tells who the characters are who come to the stable the night Jesus is born.
