"Do not be afraid, for I know that you are looking for Jesus, who was crucified. He is not here; he has risen."



Someone once said, "I don't like surprises. I am afraid of them because surprises are either too good

to believe, or too bad to accept." Like them or not, surprises are inevitable in this world. God gives us some surprises throughout our lives. Abraham was surprised by three visitors while he was resting under a tree (Gen 18) and was surprised to hear that he was going to have a child at the age of 100. Moses was in the desert when he found God in a burning bush. Mary and Joseph were surprised by the visit of angel to tell them that they are going to be the parents of the savior of the world.

The one consistent element in the gospel accounts of that first Easter morning that we are journeying towards, is that everyone was surprised. No one expected an empty tomb, much less the presence of the risen Christ.

The women who came to the tomb had good reason to be surprised. They had watched Jesus die. Those women stood by the cross and watched as his body was removed from the cross and taken away for burial. They had followed Joseph to the tomb. They had heard the heavy thud of the stone that was rolled in front of the opening. They knew Jesus was dead. Then they departed for home. On Sunday morning, they resolved to honor one last time the man they had followed. They prepared embalming spices and perfumes to anoint his body. Here they are at the tomb to find it open wide and empty. They were surprise, confused and puzzled. The death and burial already took a toll on them, now the body is not there. They probably felt defeated and

devastated. Since we know what happened next, we may not understand the amount of disappointment the women felt. It is difficult to hold on to the promises of God in times of grief and devastation.

'Surprise' is defined by dictionaries as an unexpected or astonishing event, fact, or thing. God is not limited and does not have unexpected events, fact or thing. God doesn't have surprises, but humans do. We are limited by time and space. God is the author of all things and sustainer of all that is seen and unseen. Jesus had


told them several times that he would rise again on the third day. But they failed to remember. But the Jewish leaders remembered that, and they asked for soldiers to guard the tomb. Then out of the darkness, comes the sound of the angel. The angel said to the women, "Do - Matthew 28:5-6

not be afraid, for I know that you are looking for Jesus, who was crucified. He is not here; he has risen." God knows what we are going through. He knows what we are looking for. We want the old Jesus back, or at least his body back, so that we can anoint him. But God has a better plan. Jesus has a transformed body now, that does not need anointing with spices.

His risen body is proof that He has the power to transform our situations. He will transform the situation of our surprise moments to experiences of excitement. When we go through the dark valleys, turn to the promise of God, "though I walk through the dark valleys, you are with me." God's promises are true today as they were on the day of the first Easter. God's promises comfort us even in the middle of a grave.

On Easter morning, the women were surprised to encounter a risen Christ in the midst of their sorrow and tears. At times we think that God has forgotten us, but God promises to find us even in the darkest valleys and the farthest corners. We should not be surprised to discover God wherever we need Him most. In hospital rooms and nursing homes, in moments of fear and worries, in times of disagreement and confusion, God astonishes us with grace and love. When medical tests reveal some type of rare disease that invaded your body and you find out that it is terminal, Easter story gives hope. Because Jesus rose again, we have reason to believe that he would rescue us.

We may be going through personal experiences of pain and sorrow. We may be pricked by the thorns of ques-



tions, doubts, and uncertainties; but let us hold on to God's promises. Because of Easter, we can look for the buds of new life. With hope and faith, our pain and suffering will end in new life. That is God's promise at Easter.

The angel said to the women, "Do not be afraid, for I know that you are looking for Jesus, who was crucified. He is not here; he has risen. He is going ahead of you to Galilee, there you will see him." It is reason to be more excited than surprised because he is already there ahead of us waiting at the 'Galilee' of tomorrow. This might very well be one of the best Easters ever if we open our eyes, hearts, and spir-

its to recognize God in unusual places. May God increase in us faith for today and hope for tomorrow.



Zion's Quilters are Collecting Personal Care Kits Supplies during Lent!

Each year as the quilters are busy every Tuesday making quilts to send to Lutheran World Relief (LWR), we also gather supplies to make Personal Care Kits to send there also. In October 2022 we were able to assemble 40 Personal Care Kits with your help. Thank you!

The supplies needed for each Kit:

- One (1) light-weight bath-size towel (20"x40" to 52"x27").
- Two (2) or three (3) bath-size bars of soap equaling 8 to 9 oz., any brand, in original wrapping, no mini or hotel size bars.
- One adult-size toothbrush in its original packaging.
- One sturdy comb. There are many different types of hair texture, so no picks or fine-toothed combs. Remove packaging.
- One metal nail clippers (attached file optional). Remove packaging.

From Health Ministry Committee...

What Is SPLASH??? While visiting my granddaughter in Love's Park, IL in 2011 a couple of months after her baptism, I saw a mailing called SPLASH that she received in the mail each month from their ELCA Lutheran Church. The first months of SPLASH and a music CD were included in Lexi's gift basket when she was splashed at her baptism, and then each consecutive issue was mailed monthly thereafter. Each corresponded with her age and concluded with her 36th month. As I read through the monthly pamphlet I thought, "What a wonderful way to keep a newly baptized child and young family connected at church and help with faith formation as part of the baptismal promise - all with the help of this monthly SPLASH mailing!"

I brought the idea back to Zion to Bonnie Little, Education Leader, at that time, to our Parish Nurse and Health Ministry Committee. All were very interested in the concept, so Bonnie and I volunteered to help get these ordered through Augsburg Fortress. HMC put them into the baptismal baskets of Zion members since they had always put the baskets together, and I agreed to send the monthly mailings to each child. We are now starting our 11th year of this project.

SPLASH is divided into 3 sections: Birth-12 months plus a music CD; 13-24 months plus a CD; 25-36 months plus a CD. Each yearly curriculum booklet costs about \$17 per child plus the monthly mailing expenses. Birthday messages, Christmas cards, and special extra ideas are included throughout the year.

Each monthly mailing (Birth-12 months) contains a parent page with resources to support the central role of faith formation (baptismal promise) and physical

development suggestions for that child's age. Middle pages include appropriate activities for play, family time, meals, and snacks. Ideas for prayer, worship, and Bible storytelling are included. The back page has a cartoon along with a prompt that invites the parent to jot down a memory from that moment of development.

The 13th-24th monthlies delve a little more into Bible story time, word development, family devotions, prayer, and "Family Kin-nections"- ideas to connect the child with siblings, grandparents, and other family members.

The 25th-36th monthlies delve deeper into the child's development and how a parent can help in faith formation. With the 36th month, I include a letter emphasizing how the child has been SPLASHED since baptism and suggest that the child is ready for preschool Sunday School. The Sunday School Superintendent is notified to invite the child to join Zion's Sunday School.

I smile as I see the young children up front for children's sermons and joining in the prayers at the end of a service. They are children I SPLASHED each month with the help of our Health Ministry Committee. The HMC feels this has been a very important part of our ministry at Zion for the youngest children and their parents to help in faith formation. We will continue this part of our ministry, and hope you now better understand the purpose of *SPLASH*.
